




### What will be on the ballot?


On Nov. 5, the Forest Preserve District will ask voters to consider a referendum to increase the limiting rate of its tax levy.

Per state law, the Forest Preserve District can only increase this rate with voter approval.

The Forest Preserve District would use these additional funds to further support its mission.

- Preserve, restore, and maintain forests, other open spaces, and water quality
- Acquire lands to protect rivers, watersheds, and wildlife habitats
- Plant trees and enhance flood-control and drainage systems
- Maintain and improve woodlands, wetlands, and prairies
- Provide nature-education and outdoor opportunities for all ages
- Increase access and safety in the forest preserves
- Improve trails, campgrounds, and other recreational features





### Why is the referendum on the ballot?

Much has changed since 2006, when DuPage voters last approved a Forest Preserve District referendum.

The current property tax levy rate does not provide enough annual revenue to support operations and additional land acquisitions.

If the referendum passes, revenue per \$100 paid in taxes would be \$1.90.



# How would the referendum affect me if it passes?

If you own property in DuPage County, you would pay \$11.67 more per year for every \$100,000 of its fair market value.

## How would the Forest Preserve District use the additional funds?

The money would allow the Forest Preserve District to continue maintaining and creating high-quality habitats for wildlife, plants, and people in the preserves' woodlands, prairies, wetlands, and waterways and maintaining and improving its recreational amenities.

It would also allow the Forest Preserve District to purchase more than 250 acres of open space and to complete several planned projects over the next 10 years, including tree-planting and restoration projects, infrastructure improvements, and regional trail connections.
